What's been happening?

Heritage Lighting: Amey's efforts to install heritage lighting resulted in a variety of interim light fittings as the heritage units were not in stock. The first heritage units have appeared in North Pathway; we are assured that embellishment will follow. The location and brightness of the lamps has upset many residents and little account was taken of the particular needs conservation area. improvement in lighting levels compared to the old lights is desirable the height and brightness seem to be causing particular problems in places. The post heights need reducing and this is not a problem to do. as all the signage posts were cut down to size after installation when the one way system was put in place. Those posts are exactly the same size as the new lighting. Let's hope the sizing is done at the same time as the heritage lanterns are fitted! Comments on the lighting are welcome on the blog on the MRA website.

Drainage super tank.

Severn Trent put forward proposals to site a massive drainage tank in the Valley allotments. This will be over 25 feet (7.5m) in diameter (wider than a house) and around 55feet deep. Construction of the tank will have a huge impact on the allotments and permanently remove the equivalent of one allotment in area. The retention of these allotments was hard won and any further loss cannot be mitigated by token hedge planting. Severn Trent have now visited the estate and

seen the Trust's proposals for restoration and the importance of these allotment areas as part of the community infrastructure. Working with the MRG and Trust it is hoped that a far better mitigation solution can be arrived at which will have long term benefits for the local community. The Council are in a difficult position as they put in place a legal agreement requiring the allotment space in question to be restored. With this in mind it is in everyone's interest to find an acceptable solution

Bulb planting and weed killer

Moor Pool was sprayed very late last year (March 2011. The chemical takes about six months to wear off and was applied rather too freely on the verges causing a yellowish tone; the early warm weather enhanced the problem. Strimming is not a viable alternative because it only lasts two weeks or so.

Following a meeting with Birmingham City Council, it has been agreed that the following areas will not be sprayed

- Beds managed by residents e.g. Lower Moor Pool Avenue/Wentworth Gate
- 2. Planted areas round trees but please indicate these areas by removing weeds and mulching with spent compost.
- 3. Underplanted street signs and beds with defined edges.
- 4. Bulbs in grass verges. Please plant bulbs in large blocks for easy mowing at the ends of verges or centrally.

Please leave a clear edge along verge sections so edges can be trimmed.

Restoring the Orchard by Will Harley

Recently, I started volunteering in The Orchard, an overgrown piece of land on the Moor Pool Estate which is now being used by Harborne Primary School in association with 'The Forest School' charity and the Moor Pool Trust. In this article, I'm going to tell you a little bit about 'The Forest School' and what it's doing in Moor Pool, as well as what it's like volunteering in The Orchard.

Last year, I started doing the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award with my school, and for the award you need to do at least 12 hours of volunteering spread over around three months for a non-profit organisation. I was all set to work in a charity shop on the High St, but it turns out that a project had been started here to do with Harborne Primary School. It is often said that children in the UK are becoming more and more isolated from the natural environment, and the charity basically exists to allow children in primary and secondary education to reconnect with it, but also to develop vital skills in many aspects of their development, including both social and cognitive skills. On the

Moor Pool Estate, the Forest School exists on a green space known as The Orchard, which is used by Harborne Primary School one afternoon a week.

I arranged to do my volunteering with the teacher at Harborne Primary and Moor Pool native, Mrs Gray. So now my dad and I go up every Sunday morning for an hour to work on the site. Now, before I tell you the sorts of things we've been working on, I should explain a bit about the Orchard itself.

As you walk into the Orchard, the first thing you see is a sort of clearing that has three large fruit trees in it, which is why it's called The Orchard. The ground is mostly clear of vegetation, no grass, just soil and fallen leaves, and apart from these large trees and two or three smaller ones there isn't really much else there, which is what makes it look like a clearing. Beyond the clearing in all directions are areas covered with brambles and ivy, small trees and bushes, a lot of holly, and unfortunately, also a lot of waste and litter. It seems The Orchard has been used as a dump over the years, and such abandoned items included four rusty water tanks, two old carpets and a hub cap from the wheel of a Ford.

When we started working in The Orchard, there was already evidence that the land has started to be managed again. In one corner of the clearing lay a huge pile of logs and branches. Nearer the top of the Orchard, a little circle of logs for children to sit on had been made and coming out from it was a path cut into the ivy. For the first two or three weeks, we set about finishing the work that had been started. We cut the huge pile of logs and branches into three much smaller piles of logs, sticks and leaves. We used the logs to complete the circle of logs for the kids to sit on, and when we came back the week after we had finished this, we found the clearing dotted with tiny houses made from the other two piles and some string. for the dolls and dinosaurs that we discovered were inside them. We also, with the help of my sister, finished cutting the path in the ivy from the circle of logs to

the clearing. After that, we started some bigger projects. Mrs Gray asked us to dig a 'mud pit' for the kids near the entrance. so, not knowing quite what a mud pit was, we dug a wide and shallow hole near the entrance and used the excess soil to fill in some uneven ground. Then we set to work on clearing the junk that had been dumped. Because of this rubbish, at least a third of The Orchard is out of bounds to the children for health and safety reasons. So far we've tackled most of it, but there is still a lot of rubbish under leaves and bushes around the site. More recently, we have been cutting paths into the ivy and the bushes in the previously cordoned off areas of The Orchard, and clearing up the Every week we rubbish we find there. make a little more of The Orchard usable for the kids, and I find that really rewarding.

A few weeks ago I and my sister, who had a half day from her school, got to go and see The Forest School in action. What we saw was about thirty kids, raking up leaves, helping to saw wood and peeling wood off sticks with potato peelers, and they seemed to be having great fun doing it. We talked to a couple of the teachers there, who were telling us about how the children learned such important skills here, which is what The Forest School was set up for. Once, in the middle of the circle of logs, I made an elevated, round structure out of stones and pebbles, the sort of thing that campfires would be made on (I don't really know why; maybe more for decoration rather that actual use) and according to the teachers, some of the kids thought this was made by a fairy, while others believe it is a dinosaur's nest. I also learned what a mud pit actually is: just a muddy pit where the kids can muck around in and have fun. The whole time I was thinking how much I would have loved something like this when I was in primary school.

The Orchard has certainly been put to good use, and everyone involved in it has brilliant ideas for it, but whatever we decide to do with it, it's going to be a huge job, and we're going to need all the help

we can get. If you feel like helping out, then contact Rob Sutton or Emma Gray, and whether it's clearing the rubbish, taming the ivy or digging mud pits, they'll probably have something for you to do, and you'll be able to do it whenever it suits you, as long as it isn't the afternoon in the week when the kids are there.

My dad and I have already agreed we want to continue volunteering at The Orchard after I've finished the Duke of Edinburgh Award, and I'm really looking forward to see it get better and better for the kids who use it.


