Heritage lighting: Councillor James McKay recently arranged a meeting between Birmingham City Council and representatives from Amey. Representatives from Moorpool Residents' Association and the Moorpool Heritage Trust were also in attendance with about 10 local residents. The aims of the meeting were to view the current lights along Park Edge and observe a demonstration of the effects of dimming these by 25% and then 50%.

Following considerable amount of а discussion, it became clear that

- i) the current, contemporary lights were too bright for the conservation area.
- ii) heritage lights could be installed at a lower level and no more light columns would be

needed because there was still a high level of ambient light.

John Blakemore, the Director of Highways. confirmed that the standards used to set out the lighting were for guidance only leaving room for adaptations as appropriate. However, there remain some concerns amongst those responsible for lighting that, if the guidance is not followed, Birmingham will be vulnerable to legal action should untoward events occur. This is despite some other authorities around the country actually turning their lights off at night.

The way forward now is to lobby for a risk assessment to be done so that lanterns at a lower height can be justified. Considering that the repositioning of some lights has put steps and passageways into darkness raises a real question mark over whether public safety is really that important an issue.

What's on?

Coffee mornings: take place in the small hall, 10am-12, on the last Saturday of every month except December. Everyone is welcome.

Open gardens: Mike Foster will again be opening his garden as part of the Pereira Road group. The date is 28th April, between 2 and 5 pm; on this occasion Nos 14 and 50 will be open. Two further gardens open at the end of June. Valley allotment: Severn Trent is putting in a tank on the Valley site over the next 12-14 weeks. The tank is adjacent to the MiB Valley allotment. It can't be helped but we decided it would not be easy to work there and so we are in the process of removing the polytunnel and whatever is needed to Ron Pearson's allotment off Wentworth Gate. I think this will work well and we are most grateful to Ron. Most of the preparation for the plant sale will be done there.

We also have to shift some of the plants at the Valley; they will all go to the plant sale in due course. We are not abandoning the Valley site as we plan to sow summer annuals, sweet william and wallflowers in early May. These proved popular last year when Raj sold them for MiB at the Shop. They should be ready for early autumn. The valley allotment is in excellent condition because it was doubledug by Igor Cusack and the soil there is very good – we need to value it.

Donations: If you have spare plants or plants you would like to get rid of, we are always glad of donations. In particular we welcome summer annuals, vegetables, herbaceous plants and shrubs. We can arrange collection.

RHS: It was decided not to attempt last year's level five success with the RHS. The possibility was raised of submitting some of the allotments as an entry but these are not yet ours. Instead we have a number of projects planned to improve the estate of which more details in the next Duck.

From Banner Homes:

Hello and welcome from Banner Homes. As we will be living with you for the next 12 months or so, I am keen that you are kept updated on our progress.

As you are aware, we obtained Planning Consent for the scheme in July 2012 and started production works in November 2012. Due to the sewer diversion works required on the valley site we have cleared and started work on foundations on the smaller site C. You will now see progress as the scaffolding is being erected. The diversion works at the valley site are now complete, apart from the connection to the public sewer, which is underway in Ravenhurst Road and foundations have been dug on the southern side of the site. We are hopeful that once the sewer connection and services have been completed, we will be able to keep our construction works within the confines of our site apart, obviously, from deliveries of materials.

We appreciate that there may be some difficult weeks ahead while we carry out what is considered to be the most disruptive element of our works and are grateful for your understanding and patience. Our Site Manager, Tim O'Toole, is on site to help. If you have a genuine concern, I am sure he will be more than happy to assist.

In the meantime I hope you watch with interest as our scheme develops.



Recipe slot: Pasta Florentine

This is a good recipe for using up left overs

Essential ingredients
Pasta
Black olives
Anchovies (tinned)
Olive oil
Lemon juice

Additional ingredients Red/green peppers Tomatoes Onions Broccoli (cooked) Mushrooms

Cook the pasta in the usual way and then leave to stand on a very low heat so it does not go cold.

Chop all the additional ingredients, olives and anchovies. Keep the oil from the anchovies.

Put the olive oil and anchovy oil into a saucepan and sauté the mushrooms, peppers, tomatoes and onions for 3-4 minutes.

Drain the pasta and add it to the pan.

Add the rest of the ingredients and sauté for another 2 minutes.

Garnish with fresh basil and grated cheese and serve.
